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Labor Attacked in 2014 - 2015

The 2014-2015 time period is one where legislative leaders and two different governors attempted to capture public favorability. Governor Pat Quinn (Democrat) was in office in 2014, while Governor Bruce Rauner (Republican) took office in 2015. In 2015, most House Republicans chose not to vote on many bills and amendments, not wanting to face the tough decisions their constituents sent them to Springfield to make.

Referendums

In 2014, the Democrats wanted to engage the public in a debate about a number of their core beliefs. While many of the Republicans wished to have a discussion regarding term limits and a new process for drawing district maps. The Democrats were successful in placing five questions on the ballot for the 2014 General Election: Millionaire tax of 3% (HB 3816), Minimum wage increase to \$10 (HB 3814), prescription drug coverage of birth control (HB 5755), crime victim bill of rights (HJRCA 1), and prohibiting election discrimination (HJRCA 52). All five questions passed overwhelmingly in the 2014 General Election. The only action that ensued in the General Assembly in 2015 was the passage of a minimum wage bill (SB 11) in the Senate, it has not been called for a vote in the House.

Firefighters Pass Staffing Levels

The Firefighters scored a big victory by passing HB 5485 (Mayfield/Mulroe). It was signed into law by Governor Quinn. The bill restores current law and provides that in the case of a fire fighter, and fire department or fire district paramedic matters, the arbitration decision shall be limited to wages, hours, and conditions of employment, including staffing levels, and also including residency requirements in municipalities with a population under 1 million.

Right to Work

Illinois House Speaker Madigan facilitated a vote on one of Governor Rauner's top issues. HB 1286, HA #2 was language filed regarding "right to work zones" in Illinois. It would have allowed local bodies by ordinance or referendum to declare them as a right to work zone, where union membership is optional. The vote on the amendment failed by a vote of 0-72-37, with all democrats voting no, one republican voting no, and all other republicans either voting present or not voting.

Collective Bargaining and Prevailing Wage

Multiple votes were taken by the House on amendments to strip collective bargaining rights and diminish prevailing wage laws in Illinois. The votes taken were on identical language, and the House voted separately over ten times. The language would allow for local governments and school districts to decide what subjects can be collectively bargained, and what projects are subject to prevailing wage. House Republicans either did not show up to vote or simply voted present each time. None of the amendments have been adopted.

Arbitration Bill

Perhaps the biggest battle for labor in the General Assembly came in 2015. The common sense legislation (SB 1229) would have provided for binding arbitration as an alternative to a lockout or strike if state contract negotiations break down between Governor Rauner and state employee unions. Both chambers passed the bill, Governor Rauner issued a total veto. The Senate overrode the Governor's veto. The battle was in the House, where labor was only able to secure 68 (needing 71) votes to override the veto. State Representative Ken Dunkin turned his back on working families that day by not showing up in Springfield. In the end, labor could not combat the ferocious and false attacks by Governor Rauner. Many House Republicans didn't show up to vote, or voted present.

Buy American

The United Auto Workers are continuing to seek legislation that would require all vehicles purchased or leased by state agencies to be made in North America (HB 3861 – 98th GA & HB 3438 – 99th GA). They hope to complete passage of this legislation in the Senate sometime in 2016. In 2014, both chambers passed a measure requiring state parks, museums, and the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Museum to have a booth dedicated to American made goods. It was signed into law by Governor Quinn.

Explanation of Voting Record

This document represents the official Voting Record of Illinois legislators on issues of importance to working families and their unions during 2014-2015. Illinois lawmakers are rated on their votes on key labor issues. This record will become the basis for our future political activity.

The current make up of the Illinois Senate is 39 Democrats and 20 Republicans. In the Illinois House there are 71 Democrats and 47 Republicans.

The Illinois delegation in the U.S. House of Representatives currently includes 8 Republicans and 10 Democrats. Illinois' two U.S. Senate seats are held by Sen. Dick Durbin (D) and Sen. Mark Kirk (R).

This voting record is compiled on behalf of the Executive Board of the Illinois AFL-CIO. The Illinois AFL-CIO's Committee on Political Education (COPE) will meet prior to both the primary and general elections and will make endorsement recommendations to the Executive Board. This record will play an important role in the endorsement process for all incumbents running for re-election or for election to another office. Non-incumbents are asked to complete a questionnaire and will be recommended by Congressional District COPE Committees on the basis of their questionnaire responses and interviews.

We wish to extend our appreciation to all incumbent lawmakers, Democrat and Republican, who supported working families. In making recommendations for endorsement, the legislator's overall record, including previous legislative sessions, may be considered.

Illinois Senate Bills - 2015

1. **HB 439 - Transportation: Uninsured / Underinsured Coverage**
Hoffman/Munoz - SUPPORT
Requires a contract carrier transporting employees, including but not limited to railroad employees, to verify hit and run and uninsured motor vehicle coverage, as well as underinsured motor vehicle coverage, in an amount not less than \$500,000 (rather than \$1,000,000) per passenger beginning on January 1, 2016, and not less than \$750,000 per passenger on and after January 1, 2020.
Passed House 108-4-0. Passed Senate 51-0-0. Governor issued total veto - bill died.
2. **HB 3497 - CDB / Single Prime Procurement**
Currie/Munoz - SUPPORT
It provides the Capital Development Board (CDB) with continued authority to use the Single Prime project/procurement method with protected subcontractor contract delivery method for procuring construction projects and gives CDB greater ability to take advantage of efficiencies achieved using this approach. Under current law, CDB's Single Prime authority expires on July 1, 2015. This legislation would extend the expiration date by five years.
Passed House 110-0-1. Passed Senate 57-0-0. The bill was signed into law, PA 99-257.
3. **SB 11 - Minimum Wage**
Lightford/Turner - SUPPORT
Would increase Illinois' minimum wage to \$9 on July 1, 2015, then increase 50 cents each year until 2019. Provides for a tax break for small businesses (50 employees or less) that pay the minimum wage.
Passed Senate 35-18-1. Referred to House Rules.
4. **SB 47 - Temp Worker Agency Reporting**
Clayborne/Dunkin - SUPPORT
Would require temporary worker agencies to report race and ethnicity of the individuals they send out to work. Ken Dunkin refused to call bill.
Passed Senate 30-16-1. Referred to House Rules.
5. **SB 564 - Board and Commission Internet Notice**
Biss/Jackson - SUPPORT
Requires the Governor's Office of Boards and Commissions to establish and maintain on the Internet: (1) a centralized location for an electronic mail listserv for users to receive notices of the meetings of each board and commission and their agendas; and (2) a listing of the meetings times and agendas for each board and commission.
Passed Senate 51-0. Passed House 114-0. Signed by Governor, PA 99-218.
6. **SB 1229 - Interest Arbitration**
Harmon/Smiddy - SUPPORT
Provides for an alternative to strike as a means of resolving an impasse during the negotiation of collective bargaining agreements. Extends the interest arbitration procedures of the IPLRA to employees of state agencies and provides for the continuation of the provisions of expired contracts while arbitration is pending, thereby averting the disruption of state services that would result from a work stoppage.
Passed Senate 38-17-0. Passed House 67-25-3. Total Veto by Governor. Motion to override passes Senate 38-15-0. Motion to override fails in House 68-34-9. Bill died.
7. **SB 1834 - Contract Carrier Video**
Biss/D'Amico - SUPPORT
Provides that a person may operate a video event recorder in a contract carrier vehicle. Provides that a contract carrier vehicle carrying passengers that is equipped with a video event recorder shall have a notice posted in a visible location stating that a passenger's conversation may be recorded.
Passed Senate 57-0. Passed House 112-0. Governor issues AV. Governor issues AV - bill died.
8. **SB 2040 - Frontline Services Budget**
Steans/Madigan - SUPPORT
One month budget for July 2015. Would have provided funding for frontline state services.
Passed Senate 39-0-15. Passed House 71-19-13. Governor issues total veto - bill died.

Illinois House Bills - 2015

1. **HB 397 - Charter Schools**
Welch/Bush - SUPPORT
Would amend the current statute to disallow the State Charter School Commission from reversing a school board's decision to deny, revoke, or not renew a charter.
Passed House 60-40-2. Referred to Senate Assignments
2. **HB 439 - Transportation: Underinsured / Uninsured Motorist Coverage**
Hoffman/Munoz - SUPPORT
Requires a contract carrier transporting employees, including but not limited to railroad employees, to verify hit and run and uninsured motor vehicle coverage, as well as underinsured motor vehicle coverage, in an amount not less than \$500,000 (rather than \$1,000,000) per passenger beginning on January 1, 2016, and not less than \$750,000 per passenger on and after January 1, 2020.
Passed House 108-4-0. Passed Senate 51-0-0. Governor issued total veto - bill died.
3. **HB 692, HA #1 - Property Tax Freeze**
Bradley - OPPOSE
Property Tax freeze. Cutting funding for frontline services. Would result in draconian cuts in education.
Amendment adopted 44-21-31. Bill failed on floor 41-21-36.
4. **HB 692, HA #2 - Local Government Bargaining Limits**
Bradley - OPPOSE
Prohibits public employees and labor organizations from collectively bargaining on core issues. Prohibits prevailing wage from being paid on local government and school construction projects.
Amendment failed 0-71-25.
5. **HB 1286, HA #2 - Right to Work**
Madigan - OPPOSE
Right to Work legislation. This would authorize a unit of local government to create a right to work zone.
Failed in House 0-72-37.
6. **HB 1287, HA #1 - Workers Compensation Restrictions**
Madigan - OPPOSE
Provides that an injury is deemed to arise out of and in the course of employment only if it is reasonably apparent, upon consideration of all circumstances, that the accident is the major contributing cause of the injury and it does not come from a hazard or risk unrelated to the employment to which employees would have been equally exposed outside of the employment. Provides that an injury resulting directly or indirectly from idiopathic causes is not compensable.
Failed in House 0-69-38
7. **HB 1288 - Domestic Workers Bill of Rights**
Hernandez/Silverstein - SUPPORT
Creates the Domestic Workers' Bill of Rights Act. Amends the Illinois Human Rights Act, the Minimum Wage Law, the Wages of Women and Minors Act, and the One Day Rest in Seven Act to provide that domestic employees are included within the scope of those Acts.
Passed House 75-31-1. Referred to Senate Assignments.
8. **HB 3438 - North American Made Vehicles**
Smiddy/Koehler - SUPPORT
Requires the state to purchase North American made vehicles.
Passed House 70-42-0. Referred to Assignments.
9. **HB 3497 - CDB Single Prime Procurement**
Currie/Munoz - SUPPORT

U. S. House Bills - 2015 (Interim)

- 1. Roll Call 28 Regulatory Accountability Act:**
The Regulatory Accountability Act (RAA) is drafted as an amendment to the Administrative Procedure Act (APA), but it goes far beyond establishing procedures for rule making. The RAA acts as a “super mandate” overriding the requirements of landmark legislation such as the Occupational Safety and Health Act and Mine Safety and Health Act. The bill would require agencies to adopt the least costly rule, instead of the most protective rule as is now required by the OSH Act and MSH Act. It would make protecting workers and the public secondary to limiting costs and impacts on businesses and corporations. Y=W, N=R
- 2. Roll Call 64 Unfunded Mandates:**
H.R. 50 would add burdensome and costly analytical and procedural requirements to the rule making process making it much more difficult to issue needed protections. The development of major workplace safety rules already takes 6–10 years; these bills will further delay these rules and cost workers their lives. Both of these bills make costs and impacts on businesses the primary consideration in establishing new rules, instead of protecting the public. Y=W, N=R
- 3. Roll Call 128 NLRB Elections:**
Disapproval of an NLRB rule that modernized the filing and communications process that occur during a union petition and election. Y=W, N=R
- 4. Roll Call 190 Official Time:**
The amendment, introduced by Rep. Jody Hice (GA), was one of eight amendments that were offered to the Military Construction - Veterans Affairs Appropriations Act, 2016 (H.R. 2029). Official time gives workers the ability to resolve disputes efficiently so employees can get back to work. The REINS Act would radically alter the regulatory process by requiring Congress to vote to approve all major rules before they can go into effect. Under the REINS Act, politics—not scientific judgment or expertise—would dictate all regulatory actions. - 11. Roll Call 487 VA Accountability Act Takano Amendment:**
Labor-supported amendment would establish improved employee accountability measures while protecting the basic due process rights of the front line workforce. The Takano substitute includes an exception to current civil service protections where an employee presents a direct threat to public health, but would retain post-removal appeal rights, including notice, a hearing and a written decision. - 12. Roll Call 489 VA Accountability Act Final Passage:**
H.R. 1994 eliminates fundamental due process rights for non-management VA employees, including over 100,000 veterans in the VA workforce. The provisions in this legislation would lead to more retaliation against whistle blowers – not less – and far fewer employees would be willing to take the risk of coming forward to expose threats to patient care. U. S. Senate Bills - 2014

1. **Wilkins nomination**
Confirmation of President Barack Obama's nomination of Robert L. Wilkins of the District of Columbia to be a judge for the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit. Confirmed by a vote of 55-43. Y=R, N=W. Roll Call Vote 7.
2. **Unemployment Insurance Benefits extension (H.R. 3979)**
This bill extended eligibility for expanded unemployment benefits through May 31, 2014. The bill also prohibited individuals with adjusted gross incomes of \$1 million or more from receiving benefits. Passed 59-38. Y=R, N=W. Roll Call Vote 101.
3. **Paycheck Fairness (S. 2199)**
The Paycheck Fairness Act would have required employers to demonstrate that wage gaps between men and women doing the same work were actually due to factors besides gender. It also would have prohibited retaliation against workers who shared salary information or inquired about their employers' wage practices. The bill would have brought Equal Pay Act remedies and class action procedures into conformance with those available for other civil rights claims, and required the Labor Department to provide training and collect wage information. Rejected 53-44. Y=R, N=W. Roll Call Vote 103.
4. **Minimum Wage Increase (S. 2223)**
This bill would have increased the federal minimum wage from \$7.25 to \$10.10 by 2016. It would have gradually increased the minimum cash wage for workers who receive tips until it equaled 70 percent of the federal minimum wage for other workers. Rejected 54-42. Y=R, N=R. Roll Call Vote 117.
5. **Student Loan Refinancing (S. 2432)**
Republicans in the Senate blocked discussion of Sen. Elizabeth Warren's (D-MA) Bank on Students Emergency Loan Refinancing Act when they rejected a motion to consider debate on a bill that would allow eligible borrowers to refinance their student loans. Rejected 56-38. Y=R, N=W. Roll Call Vote 185.
6. **Harris nomination**
Confirmation of President Barack Obama's nomination of Pamela Harris of Maryland to be a judge for the 4th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals. Confirmed 50-43. Y=R, N=W. Roll Call Vote 117.
7. **Highway Trust Fund Reauthorization – Extension Agreement (H.R. 5021)**
Senator Carper amendment that reauthorized federal-aid highway and transit programs through Dec. 19, 2014 and compelled Congress to attempt to find a long-term funding solution before the end of the year. Passed 66-31. Y=R; N=W. Roll Call Vote 245.
8. **Highway Trust Fund Reauthorization – Funding Cuts (H.R. 5021)**
A dangerous amendment by Senator Lee that would have drastically reduced—already insufficient—funding for the federal highway and transit program from \$37.6 billion to \$7.6 billion. Rejected 28-69. Y=W, N=R. Roll Call Vote 246.
9. **Bring Jobs Home Act (S. 2569)**
A bill that would have given businesses a tax credit for up to 20 percent of the expenses incurred by bringing work done in foreign countries back into the United States, provided the business also increased its number of full-time employees. It also would have prohibited tax deductions for expenses incurred when moving jobs outside the U.S. Rejected 54-42. Y=R, N=W. Roll Call Vote 249.
10. **Supplemental Appropriations – Child Refugees (S. 2648)**
Appropriations bill that allocated \$3.6 billion in supplemental appropriations, including \$2.73 billion to assist immigrant children and \$615 million for wildfire suppression. The bill contained emergency funding to care for child refugees from Central America. It included funding to help identify children eligible for protective status to ensure they would not be returned to dangerous situations. Passed 63-33. Y=R, N=W. Roll Call Vote 250.

U. S. House Bills - 2014

1. **Crippling the Federal Rule-Making Process – ALERRT Act (H.R. 2804)**

The Achieving Less Excess in Regulation and Requiring Transparency Act (ALERRT) combined four measures, all of which were designed to stop, delay, or weaken new protections. The Regulatory Accountability Act (RAA) is the most far-reaching of these measures, overriding requirements of landmark legislation such as the Occupational Safety and Health Act (OSHA) and the Mine Safety and Health Act (MSHA). Its primary goal was limiting costs and the impact on businesses and corporations; protections for workers and the general public were a distant second. Rather than improving the regulatory process, this package would cripple it by further tilting the process in favor of business groups and making it more difficult to protect the health and safety of workers and the public. Passed 236-179. Y=W, N=R. Roll Call Vote 78.

2. **Republican Leadership Budget Resolution (H.Con. Res. 96)**

This budget resolution would cut taxes for millionaires and corporations that send jobs overseas, and pay for those tax cuts by cutting programs that serve the middle class and low-income families. H. Con. Res 96 would cut education, research, infrastructure, and other critical investments by 30 percent over 10 years: higher education by \$260 billion over 10 years; K-12 education by \$85 billion; and Medicaid by \$732 billion. H. Con. Res. 96 would also cut transportation investment by \$52 billion in FY 2015 alone. Finally, the budget would also turn Medicare into a voucher program, raise the Medicare eligibility age to 67, and repeal the Affordable Care Act (ACA). Passed 219-205. Y=W, N=R. Roll Call Vote 177.

3. **National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) – Jenkins Amendment on Moratorium on DoD In sourcing Functions Performed by Contractors (H.R. 4435)**

Amendment offered by Rep. Lynn Jenkins (R-KS) to H.R. 4435, the 2015 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA), that would effectively prohibit the Department of Defense (DoD) from in sourcing functions that were performed by contractor employees before the

date of NDAA's enactment. DoD would be forced to use contractors for the performance of inherently governmental functions until a new cost comparison process is developed—regardless of the increased risk to the public interest. DoD would never be able to stop using contractors for many functions—regardless the increased risk to the public. DoD would never be able to correct - through in sourcing - contracts that cost too much or are poorly performed - regardless of the increased costs to the taxpayers. Rejected 179-244. Y=W, N=R. Roll Call Vote 235.

4. **Ellison Amendment on Fair Labor Standards in Federal Contracting (H.R. 4660)**

This amendment would bar the use of funds provided by the bill to enter into contracts with vendors in violation of fair labor standards. Rejected 196-211. Y=R, N=W. Roll Call Vote 262.

5. **Fiscal 2015 Transportation – HUD Appropriations Broun Amendment Cutting Amtrak Funding (H.R. 4745)**

This amendment undermines Amtrak's ability to provide the rail service upon which passengers and communities have come to rely. Rep. Paul Broun's amendment would arbitrarily cut Amtrak's operating funding by \$34 million. The base bill already makes unacceptable cuts to Amtrak's capital budget, endangering the efficiency of the system and delaying urgently needed improvements to infrastructure and rail cars that are urgently needed. This amendment is particularly ill-advised at a time when Amtrak is setting ridership records year after year and recent polling shows that the railroad has broad public support across the country. Rejected 154-248. Y=W, N=R. Roll Call Vote 273.

6. **Fiscal 2015 Transportation – HUD Appropriations Denham Amendment Ending Federal Funding for California High-Speed Rail (H.R. 4745)**

This amendment singles out one project in a single state—California's high-speed rail—from receiving any funds appropriated in a bill that was supposed to fund our nation's transportation needs. This project would create and sustain good-paying jobs at a time when employment opportunities are still too limited and our

economic recovery remains fragile. Completion of this project would provide California residents and visitors an efficient transportation option and provide access to multi-modal connections that are urgently needed. Passed 227-186. Y=W, N=R. Roll Call Vote 288.

7. **Fiscal 2015 Transportation – HUD Appropriations Gingrey Amendment Barring Official Time Pay (H.R. 4745)**

This amendment would bar the use of funds provided by the bill to pay a federal employee during any period when that employee is using "official time" to represent a union or its bargaining unit employees. The Gingrey Amendment would serve no purpose but to erode collective bargaining rights for civil service federal employees at greater cost to American taxpayers. Union representation for employees working their way through administrative procedures is a cost-effective process for administrating and adjudicating agency policies. The alternative to official time is for government agencies to needlessly pay for costly third party attorney and arbitrator fees. Using this time for internal union business is strictly prohibited by law: under current law, official time may not be used to solicit membership, conduct internal union meetings, elect union officers, or engage in partisan political activities. The notion that official time is used for these purposes is blatantly false. Rejected 167-254: R 167-60. Y=W, N=R. Roll Call Vote 295.

8. **HR 4923: Energy and Water Development and Related Agencies Appropriations Act—King Davis-Bacon Repeal Amendment (H.R. 4923)**

The Davis-Bacon prevailing wage law ensures that workers on public construction projects funded by taxpayer dollars are paid a wage comparable to the local standard or "prevailing" wage. It prevents unscrupulous contractors from low-balling bids and undercutting community wages with cheap, unskilled labor. During consideration of Energy and Water Development and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, Rep. Steve King (R-IA) offered an amendment that would bar the use of funds to enforce Davis-Bacon Act prevailing wage requirements. The amendment failed on July 10 by a vote of 181 to 239: R 181-46; D 0-193; I 0-0. Y=W, N=R. Roll Call Vote 388.

U. S. House Bills - 2014

9. Child Tax Credit Expansion (H.R. 4935)

This legislation expands eligibility for the Child Tax Credit (CTC) by raising the threshold to \$150,000 per year, but fails to permanently extend an expiring provision that allows low income families to access the credit. Over 60 percent of families using the refundable CTC earn less than \$25,000 per year. Nearly half of these families are raising children on wages of \$10 an hour or less. Failing to permanently extend access for low-income families could take money out of the pockets of working families and hurt children at a time when child poverty is at its highest level in decades. The legislation would also deny the refundable portion of the credit to immigrants who file taxes with an IRS-issued Individual Tax Identification Number (ITIN) and are currently eligible, resulting in over two million working families and 5.5 million children being denied the credit, 4.5 million of whom are U.S. citizens. Passed on July 25 by a vote of 237-173: R 212-5; D 25-168; I 0-0. Y=W, N=R. Roll Call Vote 451.

10. Supplemental Border Appropriations – Endangering Child Refugees (H.R. 5230)

The AFL-CIO opposed the Supplemental Border Appropriations bill. While additional funding was necessary to care for child refugees arriving in 2014 from Central America, the funding levels in H.R. 5230 did not adequately ensure that children eligible for protective status were identified and not returned to dangerous situations. The legislation also included harmful policy changes that compromised due process and ran counter to established U.S. and international norms regarding the detention of children and refugees. Passed on August 1 by a vote of 223-189: R 222-4; D 1-185; I 0-0. Y=W, N=R. Roll Call Vote 478.

11. Deportation Deferral Ban - Ending Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (H.R. 5272)

In June 2012, the Obama Administration created the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) by executive action. The program protects immigrant youth who arrived in the US prior to June 2007 from deportation and provides two year work-authorization. The AFL-CIO strongly supports DACA and opposed H.R. 5272 which, if enacted, would have denied funding to issue deferred action and work permits to any new or pending DACA-eligible youth applicants. Passed 216-192: R 212-11; D 4-181; I 0-0. Y=W, N=R. Roll Call Vote 479.
